Course Objective:

The main objective of this course is to provide students with the introductory understanding on American foreign policies regarding major security issues and global economic matters. Though the focus of the course will be on explaining the current and past US policy debates, the substantial portions of the course will be reserved to discuss the applications and implications of those debates by exploiting various theoretical approaches from IR (International Relations) and IPE (International Political Economy).

Course Requirements & Grading Scheme:

Although the format of the class is not a seminar, students are expected to participate actively during the class discussion. Questions during lectures will be highly encouraged as well. Besides participation and attendance, this course has four other requirements.

(1) Mid-term exams: The first mid-term ("in-class") exam will include several short identifications on the key theoretical terms and concepts. It will also include a couple of essay questions. It will be administered on Oct. 16th. The second mid-term will be a "take-home" exam. It will be distributed on Nov. 1st and it is due on Nov 8th. More detailed instructions on this take-home exam will be given during classes.

(2) "Comparative & critical" book review (7-10 pages, double-spaced): Select two of the following books (but not from the same author), and briefly summarize the key (theoretical as well as practical) arguments of each book. Be sure to *analyze and critically compare* its "policy implications" in the context of US foreign policy. It is due on Nov. 29th.
