

**Elliot E. Slotnick** received his Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota in 1976. He is a Professor of Political Science and an Associate Dean of the Graduate School at The Ohio State University where he has taught since 1977. His main area of interest is in judicial politics and he has published articles in numerous journals including the AMERICAN JOURNAL OF POLITICAL SCIENCE, THE JOURNAL OF POLITICS, AMERICAN POLITICS QUARTERLY, WESTERN POLITICAL QUARTERLY, POLITY, the YALE LAW AND POLICY REVIEW, and JUDICATURE. He has contributed pieces to a number of anthologies and has edited *Judicial Politics: Readings from Judicature* and co-edited *Readings in American Government and Politics*. His co-authored book, *Television News and the Supreme Court: All the News That's Fit to Air?*, was published by Cambridge University Press in 1998. Slotnick has been a student of federal judicial selection processes and their outcomes since the 1970s and, in recent years, he has collaborated with Sheldon Goldman on a series of articles on judicial selection during the Clinton and Bush administrations. In March/April, 2001, Slotnick co-edited a special Symposium issue of JUDICATURE titled, *Clinton's Judicial Legacy*. Presently, he is continuing his work with Goldman in the study of federal judicial selection during the Bush administration, co-authoring a piece in the May/June 2005 issue of JUDICATURE titled "W. Bush's Judiciary: The First Term Record." Slotnick is a recipient of The Ohio State University's Outstanding Teacher Award as well as the Mentoring Award from the Law and Courts section of the American Political Science Association.
