Naka Decisions Sharp in Fight Card of Good Bouts at L Street Arena

They could fight all eight bouts over again next week and it would be perfectly all right with the cash customers who crowded the L street arena last night to witness another of Fred Pearl's fistic treats. Every bout was satisfactory from the standpoint of action and every match was a good match.

Jack Casper, holding the upper hand in the last round to earn a split hair shade, was given a draw with Johnny Morris in the main bout. Casper was slow starting and Morris piled into the Galt heavyweight for the first two rounds to do all the punching, but Casper came around in the final two stanzas to earn the draw and any shade that could be given. It was a furiously fought heavyweight battle. Morris weighed 177 and Casper 184.

## Naka Beats Sharp

Bunny Naka stopped Stanley Sharp's winning streak by taking a well deserved decision. He had Sharp reeling in the final stanza of four blistering rounds. They are featherweights.

Kazu Asazawa and Kid Ray stole the show in a whirlwind four rounder that Referee Jack Downey gave Ray on a decision. They are featherweights.

Tuffy Ziegler battled Steve Katona, a 150 pound racehorse, to a draw in a slugging match.

Red Bergland knocked out Jimmy Mandell in a round. They are 170 pounders.

Gregory Pedro outlasted Cecil Woods to win a decision. They are lightweights.

Louie Ferrari and Roxie Marvvel slugged to a draw at 148 pounds.

# FEARY AND CASPER DRAW; PRELIMINARY FIGHTS ARE GOOD

Slam-bang preliminary fights of an intensity seldom seen on any fistic program featured the boxing show last night at the L Street Arena. The main event, between Fred Feary of Stockton and Jack Casper of Galt, which ended in a draw, was tame in comparison to the whirlwind matches presented before the final bout.

The seven preliminary scraps offered the wildest mixing that has ever been crowded into one card here for several years.

## Casper Holds Own.

Casper gave Feary twenty-nine pounds in weight and held his own with the former national amateur champion. There were few real blows landed. The Stockton giant is about as clumsy a heavyweight as can be for a boxer whose backers are trying to build him up to the front ranks of his class. Feary is simply hopeless.

## Draw Is O. K.

Casper gained courage as the four-round match progressed, and landed two or three hefty punches in the last round. Previously, he has been grappling most of the time. What few punches the lighter man scored were good enough to earn him a draw. Feary was more aggressive with his awkward lunging and rushes, but his efforts netted little.

The big fellows were at a disadvantage, however, as the previous matches were so lively it would have been impossible for them to keep up the pace in the finale.

Stan Sharp, 133, knocked out Steve Korvich in the second round of the special. Korvich was down in the first, the bell saving him.

Eddie Korbett, 127, had height and reach on Kid Ray, 125-pounder from Stockton, but had a hard time getting the decision. Ray got the cheers.

Gregory Pedro, 138, and Louie Ferrari, 147, two green pea tango dancers, went to a wild draw in the opener. It was the funniest bout seen here in a long time.
