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Overview

This course will focus on a number of foundational texts in western political thought; texts that come to us from ancient Athens, republican and imperial Rome, the Christian middle ages, and the Italian Renaissance. Although they were written in times and places that are as different from each other as they are from our own, these works deal with a set of themes that remain central in modern political life, including the nature of political wisdom, the struggle between civic virtue and self-interest, and the relationship between politics and religion.

Readings

The following books are required and should be available for purchase at the OSU bookstores:

Thomas Aquinas, *Treatise on Law*, Regan translation (Hackett)

Niccolò Machiavelli, *The Prince*, Mansfield translation (Chicago)

Plato, Republic, Grube translation (Hackett)

C. D. C. Reeve, ed., The Trials of Socrates (Hackett)

In addition, a number of required readings have been placed on e-reserve through Carmen.

Requirements

- (1) Two papers on assigned topics, 5-6 pages each (c. 1,500-1,800 words):
 - 1st paper due at noon on Monday, October 13 [33%]
 - 2nd paper due at noon on Monday, November 17 [33%]
- (2) In-class final examination on Thursday, December 11 from 12:00-1:45. The exam will cover all of the course material in short-answer format, and is worth 33% of the final grade. We will hold a review session during the last scheduled class.
- (3) Careful reading preparation and active class participation are expected. Grades will be adjusted up or down by as much as one-third of a grade on this basis.
