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### **Course Description**

What do they know of England who only England know? – Rudyard Kipling Officials come to their positions of power in ways that vary over time and space. Comparativists have, historically, focused their attentions on democracies and on transitions from non-democratic regimes to democratic ones. This seminar aims to have a different, broader focus: the politics of non-democratic regimes and regime transitions of all kinds, with an emphasis on empirical analysis.

Participation & Attendance – The course is a seminar and so your attendance and active participation in the discussion is required. Each student will be asked to take the lead in discussing the week's reading once through the quarter.

Response papers – Each student is responsible for writing 3 response papers during the quarter. Response papers synthesize the readings of the week. The brief two to three page pieces are shared with the class and instructor by noon on Monday before our session.

Research Prospectus – By the end of the quarter, students are expected to turn in a research prospectus. The nature of the prospectus is described in the Week 1 piece by Roeder and in course discussions. All students should send me: (1) an idea by week 4, (2) an abstract and outline by week 6, (3) a list of data sources by week 8.
